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JAIL MINISTRY: A Mission Field in Our Backyard

The public often uses the term prison and jail interchangeably, but they are not the same. Jails are used to house people waiting for their case to be resolved or in most states, sentenced to less than a year. Prisons are used to house persons sentenced to one-year or more.

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Mass Incarceration

We live in the era of mass incarceration or over-incarceration. There are approximately 2.3 million people behind bars. The U.S. has less than 5% of the world's population, yet we have more than 20% of the incarcerated population.

Jails

- In our backyard Virtually each of the more than 3000 counties in the U.S. have a local jail and hold more than 731,000 adults and youth. Most likely your county has a jail.
- **One in three incarcerated persons** are held in jails and more than 12 million people are processed through the jails.
- **High suicide rates** Suicide in jails is an overlooked national crisis. The rate of suicide in local jails is far greater than that of state prisons and the American population in general.

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Incarcerated People experience profound

- Loss of family, friends, custody of children, employment, housing, material possessions, and reputation to name a few of the losses.
- **Brokenness** of heart and spirit where they are looking for hope and healing and open to learning about God.
- Shame Feeling unworthy of love, forgiveness and acceptance.

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Most Incarcerated People have experienced

- **Trauma** Reports indicate that 77-98% of the incarcerated have experienced interpersonal violence and/or physical/sexual abuse.
- Addictions 68% of those in jail custody report having symptoms of drug or alcohol dependence/abuse.
- Mental Illness 63% of jail residents have mental health problems.

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Children with an Incarcerated Parent

- More than 2.7 million children in the U.S. have an incarcerated parent. That equals 1 in 28 children.
- That equals **1 in 28** children.
- Approximately half of these children are under the age of 10

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Feelings and Impact on Children

- Fear and Anxiety wondering where mom or dad is and if they are safe
- **Disruptive living conditions** living with a relative or placed in foster care
- Lack of contact with incarcerated parent women, more than men receive fewer visits. Parents may not want their children to know where they are, and phone calls are expensive.
- Shame and Stigma the children feel shame of having a parent behind bars and may be labeled by others.

Cook County Jail

- Population: 5900 in jail custody, a capacity of 10,000
- About 100,000 people circulate through Cook County Jail annually
- Incarceration rate 238.3 per 1000,000

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Cook County Jail Residents

Males

Females

- 67% African American
- 21% Hispanic
- 13% Caucasian
- Average age is 33 years old
- 85% are single

68% African American 20% Hispanic/Other 14% Caucasian Average age is 34 years old 86% single

Cook County Jail Offense Types

28.7% Violent (includes harming a person) This represents less than a third of those in custody.

17.9% Property

26.9% Drug

15.4% DUI

2.2% Sex
